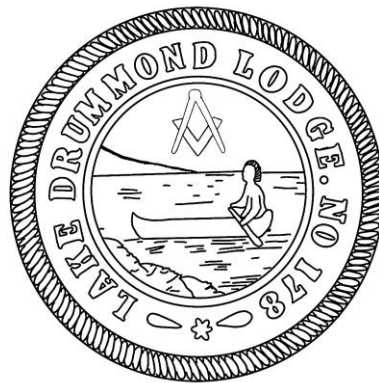

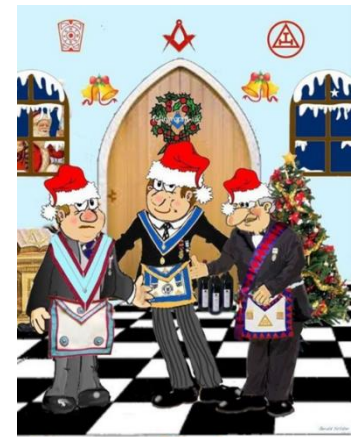

Merry Christmas

This Month in Masonic History

December

December 4: On this date in 1807, Most Worshipful Brother Prince Hall, the first African American known to have received the Masonic degrees in America, died.

December 5: On this date in 1730, Benjamin Franklin's Pennsylvania Gazette included news about several Lodges of Free-Masons meeting in that "province." Franklin was not yet a Freemason when his newspaper printed this item.

December 8: On this date in 1858, the Grand Lodge of Washington State was formed.

December 9: On this date in 1999, the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of D.C. voted to recognize the Grand Lodge of D.C.

December 12: On this date in 1787, the Grand Lodge of North Carolina was organized.

December 14: On this date in 1994, the United Grand Lodge of England issued a statement that it found the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, the source of all Prince Hall Masonry in the United States, to be regular and deserving of recognition.

December 15: On this date in 1779, American Union Lodge, a traveling lodge under the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, met and proposed that George Washington become the General Grand Master of Masons in the United States. There is no evidence that Washington ever heard about this, and no evidence that he ever held any Masonic position other than Master of a lodge. On this date in 1874, the Grand Lodge of Wyoming was formed.

December 16: On this date in 1786, the Grand Lodge of Georgia was organized.

December 17: On this date in 1867, the Grand Lodge of Idaho was formed.

December 18: On this date in 1786, the Grand Lodge of New Jersey was organized. On this date in 1799, George Washington's funeral was conducted in Masonic fashion, at Mount Vernon, Virginia. On this date in 1843, the Grand Lodge of Wisconsin was formed.

December 22: On this date in 1753, the Royal Arch degree was conferred in Fredericksburg Lodge in Virginia. This is the first unquestioned evidence of the conferral of this degree.

December 26: On this date in 1972, Harry S. Truman, former President of the United States, Past Grand Master of Missouri, and a very active Freemason, died. He had requested a Masonic funeral, but instead the government, which handled the details, permitted a short Masonic ceremony during the funeral service.

December 27: On this date in 1783, the Grand Lodge of South Carolina was organized. On this date in 1813, the Grand Lodge of Louisiana was formed. On this date in 1813, Grand Officers and Brethren of the United Grand Lodge of England consummated the union of the Moderns and Ancients into the UGLE.

December 30: On this date in 1837, the Grand Lodge of Texas was formed.

Is Father Christmas a Freemason?

I have a very serious question to put to you all. I would like to raise it with you and then do some detective work, examining the evidence that might lead us to answering it. It is a most important question that I am sure you have often asked yourself and relates our Craft to the wider society in which we live and concerns several major issues of this season. This very serious question is "Is Father Christmas a Freemason?"

Let us consider the facts of this case: Of whom does this remind you? A worthy gentleman, who is (we must admit) getting on a bit in years and is perhaps a little overweight, who wears a very distinctive costume as the badge of his activities, who provides the opportunity for friends and visitors to meet in fellowship, who is surrounded by secrecy and mystery, dispenses goodwill and the charity of gifts all over the world (avoiding ostentatious public display while doing so) and is there doing it year after year! Well, fellow detectives, you must admit that this description could fit either Santa or a Freemason. But this is merely circumstantial evidence. We need some proof!

Let us start with his movements on the evening in question. All the reports have him coming from the North Pole. As the sun rises in the east to open and enliven the day, and with him needing to finish the world before dawn, then he would have to begin in the East and move towards the West. Therefore, Father Christmas must begin his journey at the north-east corner of the world. This, of course, is exactly what we do with an Entered Apprentice. Similarly, you would assume he would finish heading for home, which would place him in the north-west corner at the end of his work, to give his salute to the world and leave. Convincing proof, you must agree! But think too, he undertakes this great journey to provide the gifts but once a year, and I am sure that any Brother Treasurer will agree that this is exactly the frequency with which most Brethren provide the gift of their charity to the lodge! And the secrecy, the mystery? Those of you who are parents, remember. What was the worst crime that an older child could commit at this time of the year? To tell the younger ones the secret of Santa, to break the faith that they should have kept. And I am sure your punishment of them pointed out that they were void of all moral worth and totally unfit to be received into the dinner table but be sent to their room for destroying something that was so good, so worthwhile and so innocent.

Surely all this evidence shows us beyond doubt that Father Christmas is a Freemason! He practices Brotherly Love and Relief; we are happy to meet him and the Christmas season, and sorry to part. All the details, his wearing of a uniform, the rituals that happen year in year out, the fact he is a male ... On a more serious note, Brethren, the way the whole Christmas season has developed and is practiced does have many things in common with Freemasonry, and we can learn much about each from the other. For instance, where did the figure we call Father Christmas come from originally? What is his background? Father Christmas, or Santa Claus, or St Nicholas has elements of pre-Christian myths and legends, which developed through the Middle Ages by being built into the great Christian story of God's wonderful gift to the world. By the eighteenth and nineteenth century these details were formalized into the character that we still have today: his stylized uniform, his way of working, his ritual activities and sayings. This all sounds very Masonic.

The pre-Christian legends of Solomon's Temple, the pyramids, Pythagoras, and so on were developed through the Middle Ages by the great Christian cathedral builders, then formalized in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries into the uniform, the work, the rituals that we use today. St Nicholas was actually a 4th century Turkish bishop who had originally been a rich nobleman. One of the stories about him was that he had helped a poor man who could not afford to pay for weddings for his 3 daughters. St Nicholas climbed onto the

roof and threw a handful of gold coins down the chimney and these coins fell into the girls' stockings that had been hung up by the fire to dry. The girls were then able to marry well and lived happily ever after.

He has been considered the patron saint of poor children ever since. The legend became very popular in Europe, especially the Netherlands where it was mixed with elements from the pagan Yule or mid-winter festivals. St Nick became Santa Claus, who would arrive on December 6th (St Nicholas' Day) mounted on a white horse and visit children to enquire about their behavior the previous year. Good children would be rewarded, and bad ones punished. The night before, children would leave a pair of the shoes or clogs out, filled with hay and carrots for the horse. In the morning these would be found, filled with sweets or small presents.

These traditions were taken to America by Dutch settlers, but it was the famous poem by Professor Clement Clark Moore which begins "'Twas the night before Christmas, and all through the house...." which settled most of the details into the Santa figure we know today. Many of these details (such as the reindeer, and their names, the flying sledge, coming down the chimney) were first brought together in this poem, but Professor Moore took them from old traditions from as far afield as Finland and Siberia and they have stuck and become a single story. You can see how similar this is to the creation of our ritual and ceremonies. While these also certainly include many elements that are ancient folklore, they were put together quite deliberately by identifiable people, with a specific aim: to create an impression in the minds of the Brethren taking part. Like the Santa legend, the details may be fictional, they may come from many different sources, and they may even be inconsistent with each other. That does not matter.

It is the impression that all of them create as an entirety that is important. Would you deny all the good that the Santa story achieves, all the happiness it creates, just because it is a story? Of course not. And this is the real linking of Father Christmas and Freemasonry. Why do we have Christmas and why do we have Father Christmas? We celebrate religious beliefs about the birth of goodness, and hope for the future; we reaffirm the belief that people are basically good and can develop into loving, caring, helpful, supporting friends to each other.

We look to a New Year where things can be better. We do this at this season whether we are celebrating the Christian Nativity, or the Jewish Hannukah with its lights and gifts and story of peace, or the Hindu Diwali with its festival of lights and gifts of sweets and toys, or even if we hold no formal religion except the pleasure of seeing a child's face transfixed with wonder and delight. And why are we Freemasons? Because we believe that there are important things like goodness and hope for the future, and that men can develop into loving, caring, helpful, supporting Brethren to their families and each other. We not only look to a future where things can be better, but we see it as our role, as Free and Accepted, or Symbolic, Masons, to help to build that future. So, I feel I can safely say that Father Christmas is a Freemason. Not only does he show so many of the signs and tokens of being one, but he brings us a message that we, as Freemasons, can heed for the whole year.

Peace on earth, good will towards men! Merry Christmas.

A Masonic Journey

*Each month we will spotlight a different Mason. We will tell his Masonic story, what brought him to Freemasonry, his most remembered masonic moment, his thoughts, his accomplishments, his dreams. We will learn about members of our Lodge by spotlighting different Masons each month. This month I would like to spotlight a mason that has inspired me, **Brother Marlin “Mo” Clugsten Patrick.***

Marlin “Mo” Clugsten Patrick is a native of Deep Creek and was raised in the Dismal Swamp area of what is now the southern portion of Chesapeake, Virginia. He grew up not far from Lake Drummond and the surrounding waterways on Douglas Road. Family, church, and lifelong friendships shaped the jolly man that “Mo” has become. From a young age, he was taught to love Christ, to respect friends and neighbors, and to share joy with those around him. Coming from a large family, six boys and a girl, “Mo” and his twin brother were the youngest. They were raised in a “Masonic Family” and those values were instilled in each of them. His mother, Elenore Patrick, and his father, William “Bill” Nelson Patrick were the Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron of the Eastern Star Chapter that met at Great Bridge Lodge where his father was a member. Many of Mo Patricks’ relatives are involved in masonry, including his mother and father; his uncle, Bro. Merdith Waller, a member of Great Bridge; his uncle, Wor. Russ Clugsten from a Lodge in Pennsylvania; and from Lake Drummond Lodge: his brother, Bro. David F. Patrick; his nephew, Bro. David F. Patrick Jr.; and his son, Bro. Marlin J. Patrick.

Sports and school kept “Mo” busy, but he was still able to start his first job at Kramer Tire while he was a senior at Deep Creek High School. Graduating in 1978, he worked at Kramer Tire until starting a new job with Ryder Truck in 1980. This is where he met his wife Kathi. They were Married in 1982 and have been married for 39 years. They have a daughter, Kimberly Denise Sprattley, and a son, Marlin James Patrick, whose seven-year-old twins, “Mo’s” grandson and granddaughter. “Mo” enjoys spoiling his grandchildren, especially since retiring from Dominion Power after 36 years in 2019.

It was at Dominion Power that he first thought about being Santa Claus. Around 1986, Dominion had asked some employees to man phone lines to answer phone calls from children who wanted to speak to Santa. After volunteering, he felt a calling to bring a little joy to children during the holidays. Each year “Mo” would improve on his portrayal of Santa until he had perfected it. Much like The Santa of legend, he gives freely of his time, money, and efforts to help brighten the lives of children and adults during the Christmas Season. He visits homes, schools, hospitals, and nursing facilities to make a difference in each life that he comes into contact with. He never charges money, nor does he ask for donations, but if one is given, he in turn, donates it to a needy family during the holidays. He has a servant’s heart, and a charitable soul. With a natural twinkle in his eye and an infectious smile, he brings about the spirit of Christmas to every place he goes.

When Marlin “Mo” Patricks’ father William “Bill” Nelson Patrick was a child growing up in the South Mills area of North Carolina, he lived next to a Masonic Lodge. “He didn’t know what they did in that building back then, but he knew what kind of men went in and out of it. When he was of age and settled he took the first step and joined Great Bridge Lodge.” This singular event had an impact on “Mo” and his family. The boys briefly joined a DeMolay Chapter, although participating for only one year, the love for Masonry was firmly planted. Bro. Marlin “Mo” Patrick joined Lake Drummond Lodge 28 years ago with his father a proud signer of his petition. He said that “Daddy loved it so well that I knew that I would too! I have many fond memories of Masonry, but my favorite is sitting in Lodge with my father. We would sit on the right side just after coming through the doors. We would sit there and enjoy our time together at Lodge.”

Bro. “Mo” Patrick says, “The Heart of a Mason is one of caring, giving, and brotherly love.” With this in mind, he stated that he has met men that were Masons in their heart even if not recognized as one. “A good man living right, believing in God, and doing the best he can, he is a Mason in his heart.” Perspective members are important to the health and growth of Masonry in general, but essential for a Lodge to survive. “I would tell anyone interested in becoming a Mason to take it seriously, and it will make you a better man. I love Jesus and he enables me to be a better man and to do things for others. You must live life as an example. I would not change a thing

since becoming a Mason. It is not cut out for everybody, but it has taught me to walk upright. The catechisms that Wor. Roy McDaniel taught me were taken to heart and have made me a better man by following their example. Plain and simple, I just love it. My son saw this and wanted to follow my example.”

Being Santa Claus has helped Bro. “Mo” bring his ideals and beliefs of making the world better, one smile at a time, into a reality. The oldest man and woman that has sat on his lap for Christmas were in their 90’s. Their smiles were as bright as a child, and they were young again, even if for just a moment. That is what Christmas is all about. “I love to see the joy in a family’s face when I show up as Santa,” sick children brighten up, the elderly start to feel young again, and the spirit of the season is all around. “When making visits I always wear my Masonic ring on the outside of my gloves. This promotes Masonry and it brings joy to the brothers that I meet. In nursing homes when you reach out and grab a brother’s hand in that knowing way and ask them about their travels you can see the excitement and pride of recognition in their faces. I know that mom and dad raised me right.”

Bro. Marlin “Mo” Patrick states that, “The Tenants of Freemasonry are all equally important. They define how a person should be, and what they should strive to become. They come together like the ingredients for a pie, blended together to create a wonderful life, and one worthy to live.” He has spent his life striving to become a better man and a worthy brother, to serve as an example for others to follow. It is with great honor that Lake Drummond has been a part of his journey and to have him among our membership.
